The Problem

LGBT Smokers are 36% more likely to get Addicted



WARNING: Menthol cigarettes are easier to smoke, but harder to quit, making you more susceptible to tobacco-related illnesses.

For 60 years,

The tobacco industry has deliberately and aggressively targeted Black communities with menthol ads to boost profits. Menthol is the most popular flavor among Black smokers, as it masks the harshness of tobacco, which allows users to smoke more while making it harder to quit.

60 Years Later:

- In the 1950s, Black people represented only 5 percent of menthol smokers; today it's 85 percent.
- More than 70,000 Black and Brown people are diagnosed with tobacco-related disease each year (Truth Initiative, 2020).
- Menthol cigarettes are the number one killer of Black people: 45,000 deaths each year.
- Now, women, youth, LGBTQ+, and people with behavioral health issues (depression, psychological distress) are using menthol at higher rates.
- 70 percent of smokers want to quit, but the addictive properties of menthol make it difficult to do so.

Big Tobacco's New Fron tier: OUR YOUTH



Big Tobacco is marketing products in kid-friendly flavors such as gummy bear, berry blend, chocolate, peach, cotton candy, strawberry, and grape. These flavors are particularly designated for e-cigarettes and cigars, as well as smokeless tobacco and hookah. And it's working:

- Flavored tobacco products play a key role in enticing kids to a lifetime of addiction.
- More than 2.5 million youth reported using e-cigarettes in 2022.
- Flavors: Nearly 85% of those youth used flavored e-cigarettes.
- Dependence: More than one in four of those youth used e-cigarettes daily.
- Flavored tobacco packaging often resembles the candy it's usually displayed near in retail outlets.

MICHIGANIS ONE OF THE WORST STATES FOR TOBACCO CONTROL POLICIES

The American Lung Association's "State of Tobacco Control" 2024 report gave the state of Michigan mostly failing grades for tobacco control policies, making it one of the worst states in the nation to prevent and reduce tobacco use.

Michigan ranks dead last for state spending on tobacco prevention – tied with West Virginia

What follows is a snapshot of selected cities and counties that helped the state earn its failing grades:

The American Lung Association calls for the following actions to be taken by Michigan's elected officials to reduce tobacco use and exposure to secondhand smoke:

- 1. Pass a law to license all tobacco retailers, including e-cigarette retailers;
- 2. Prohibit flavorings, including mint and menthol, for all tobacco products;
- Eliminate purchase, use and possession laws and preemption of stronger local laws;
- 4. Increase cigarette taxes and match the tax on non-cigarette forms of tobacco like spit tobacco, cigars, hookah and e-cigarettes to the cigarette tax.

GENESEE COUNTY

- Genesee County's smoking rate is higher than state and national averages.
- Genesee County 2023 adult smoking rate is **22.4%**, which is higher than Michigan's rate of 15.2% and the U.S. rate 13.5%.
- Smoking is a significant risk factor for poorer health (e.g., pulmonary disease, cardiac disease, etc.) and higher health care costs. There are minimal smoking cessation resources in Genesee County and those that exist are underutilized.

PONTIAC & OAKLAND COUNTY

- Tobacco retailer compliance check failure rates for sales to those in Pontiac under 21 years of age for 2022 is high at 40%.
- 24% of Pontiac's adults smoke compared to an average of 16.2% across other Dashboard cities (City Health Dashboard 2019).
- In Oakland County, 3 in 10 pregnant women smoke higher than the state rate.

JACKSON COUNTY

- 2023 Jackson County adult smoking rate: 25.8%
- 19.8% of pregnant women smoke (10.6% is the state average).
- Higher incidences of lung cancer in Jackson County than in Michigan and the U.S.
- Almost 30% of high school youth have tried tobacco.

Michigan lags behind in protecting kids and targeted communities from the dangers of nicotine and tobacco.

- The tobacco industry spends nearly \$300 million in Michigan each year to keep people addicted and to attract new, young customers.
- Tobacco use kills 16,200 Michiganders each year.
- Smoking-related annual health care costs: \$5.33 billion.
- High rates of youth vaping have erased decades of progress.
- Michigan tobacco retailers sell to kids at alarming rates one of the highest in the country.
- Michigan tobacco retailers are not required to have a license, making enforcement nearly impossible.

TOBACCO NATION: An Ongoing Crisis

Michigan is one of 13 states that make up **TOBACCO NATION**: a collection of states with the worst health outcomes from tobacco use while also being home to a disproportionate share of adult smokers.

Those states also include: ALABAMA, ARKANSAS, INDIANA, KENTUCKY, LOUISIANA, MISSISSIPPI, MISSOURI, OHIO, OKLAHOMA, SOUTH CAROLINA, TENNESSEE, and WEST VIRGINIA

TOBACCO NATION CHARACTERISTICS:

- <u>Life Expectancy</u>: Tobacco Nation residents <u>live 3 years less</u> on average and are more likely to <u>die from cancer</u> than the rest of the U.S.
- <u>Health</u>: Tobacco Nation residents report more than 20% more "poor" physical and mental health days than the average American.
- Finances: Tobacco Nation residents earn nearly 25% less per year than the rest of the U.S.
- <u>Youth Tobacco Use</u>: Compared to the 10 countries with the highest rates of tobacco use among youth, <u>Tobacco Nation ranks #5</u>.



The Solution

The Comprehensive Bill Package

- Senate Bill 647, sponsored by Sen. Sue Shink (D-Northfield Twp.), would allow local counties and cities to enact tougher restrictions on tobacco sales within their own community.
- Senate Bill 648, sponsored by Sen. Stephanie Change (D-Detroit), would tax e-cigarettes and vaping products containing nicotine for the first time and increase tobacco taxes with proceeds used to reduce tobacco use among youth.
- Senate Bills 649 and 650, introduced by Sen. John Cherry (D-Flint), would end the sale of all flavored tobacco products, including flavored e-cigarettes and <u>menthol cigarettes</u>.
- Senate Bills 651 and 652, introduced by Sen. Sam Singh (D-East Lansing), would require tobacco retailers to be licensed, just like liquor retailers, so the state can enforce laws prohibiting the sale of tobacco to minors.
- Senate Bill 653, sponsored by Sen. Mary Cavanaugh (D-Redford Twp.), and Senate Bill 654, sponsored by Sen. Paul Wojno (D-Warren), would repeal penalties against minors for tobacco purchase, use and possession, which supporters say have been "ineffective."

SURVEY OF MICHIGAN VOTERS






METHODOLOGY


- The <u>Glengariff Group</u>, <u>Inc</u>. conducted a Michigan statewide survey of likely Nov. 2024 voters.
- The 800 sample, live operator phone survey was conducted July 31-August 5, 2023.
- The margin of error for total respondents is +/-3.5 percentage points with a 95% level of confidence.
- The survey was conducted via telephone: 25% of respondents were contacted via landline phone and 75% via cell phone.
- Numbers are rounded and totals may not equal 100%.
- Survey commissioned by the Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids.

MICHIGAN VOTERS STRONGLY SUPPORT A COMPREHENSIVE LEGISLATIVE PACKAGE TO REDUCE TOBACCO USE


A recently completed statewide survey shows that Michigan voters strongly support a comprehensive legislative plan to reduce tobacco use in the state. Two-thirds of likely voters (67%) support the bill package, with nearly half of voters (48%) strongly in support.










