DOMESTIC VIOLENCE HIGH RISK RESPONSE TEAM MODEL

- Proactive, ongoing multi-sector collaboration that works together to identify high risk domestic violence cases and respond appropriately
- Work together to improve policies, procedures, and practices with regard to domestic violence cases
- Regular, ongoing meetings, including case reviews
- Focus on relationship-building and communication between roles that have traditionally not communicated at all

Several risk factors have been associated with increased risk of homicides (murders) of women and men in violent relationships. We cannot predict what will happen in your case, but we would like you to be aware of the danger of homicide in situations of abuse and for you to see how many of the risk factors apply to your situation.

Using the calendar, please mark the approximate dates during the past year when you were abused by your partner or ex partner. Write on that date how bad the incident was according to the following scale:

- 1. Slapping, pushing; no injuries and/or lasting pain
- 2. Punching, kicking; bruises, cuts, and/or continuing pain
- 3. "Beating up"; severe contusions, burns, broken bones
- 4. Threat to use weapon; head injury, internal injury, permanent injury
- Use of weapon; wounds from weapon

(If **any** of the descriptions for the higher number apply, use the higher number.) Mark **Yes** or **No** for each of the following. ("He" refers to your husband, partner, ex-husband, expartner, or whoever is currently physically hurting you.)

- _ 1. Has the physical violence increased in severity or frequency over the past year?
- Does he own a gun?
- 3. Have you left him after living together during the past year?
 - 3a. (If have *never* lived with him, check here___)
- ___ 4. Is he unemployed?
- ___ 5. Has he ever used a weapon against you or threatened you with a lethal weapon?
 (If yes, was the weapon a gun?___)
- ____ 6. Does he threaten to kill you?
- 7. Has he avoided being arrested for domestic violence?
 - 8. Do you have a child that is not his?
- 9. Has he ever forced you to have sex when you did not wish to do so?
 - 10. Does he ever try to choke you?
- 11. Does he use illegal drugs? By drugs, I mean "uppers" or amphetamines, "meth", speed, angel dust, cocaine, "crack", street drugs or mixtures.
 - 12. Is he an alcoholic or problem drinker?
- 13. Does he control most or all of your daily activities? For instance: does he tell you who you can be friends with, when you can see your family, how much money you can use, or when you can take the car? (If he tries, but you do not let him, check here:)
- _ 14. Is he violently and constantly jealous of you? (For instance, does he say "If I can't have you, no one can.")
- ___ 15. Have you ever been beaten by him while you were pregnant? (If you have never been pregnant by him, check here: ____)
 - 16. Has he ever threatened or tried to commit suicide?
- ___ 17. Does he threaten to harm your children?
 - 18. Do you believe he is capable of killing you?
 - 19. Does he follow or spy on you, leave threatening notes or messages, destroy your property, or call you when you don't want him to?
- ___ 20. Have you ever threatened or tried to commit suicide?





- Find your champion
- ▶ Reach out
- First meeting
- Find common ground
- ► Solicit feedback
- ▶ Understand limitations and "no compromise" areas
- Know what you bring to the table
- Start from where you are

WHO SHOULD BEAT THE TABLE

- ► Law enforcement
- Victim advocacy agency
- Court employees (judges, probation, pre-trial services)
- Prosecutor / DA's office
- Hospital / Medical professionals
- Youth agencies
- Local schools
- ▶ Non profit organizations
- ▶ Media
- ▶ Child Protective Services
- University / Research professionals
- Batterer Intervention Program facilitator

Think about who is doing the day-to-day work at these agencies — these are the people you need at the table!

KICK-OFF MEETING

- Go big or stay home
- Formal invitations by someone they know followed by a written invitation

- Create internal policies and practices to screen domestic violence cases and identify high risk offenders
- Leverage resources to assist the team (if needed)
- Attend monthly meetings

ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

- Team approach to leadership Law Enforcement & Victim Advocacy
 - Imperative that victim advocacy is one of the leaders
 - ► The other partner could be interchangeable BUT it is important that the team remains victim-centered and offender-focused
 - Crucial to model collaboration, mutual respect, improvement-oriented mindset, etc.
- Remaining members take on a support role
 - Expectation is that they will be leveraging their current role to assist the team
 - Members naturally commit to group on different levels
- Roles can change! Be flexible!
 - May need a "refresh"
- Be aware of creating sustainability for the group

ISSUES / BARRIERS

- Understanding each others' roles and limitations
- Fighting "this is the way it's always been done"
- Lack of training / knowledge
- Important players missing from the table

Policy/Procedure Improvements

- Referrals to HAVEN from FHPD
 - Within 24 48 hours, advocate receives police report
- Completion of Danger Assessments
- Streamlined warrant / case review with local prosecutor
 - Emailed and tracked
 - Direct contact for high risk cases
- Stricter, more appropriate bond conditions
 - No weapons provision
 - Increased use of tethers
- Protocol created for victim notification in case of walk-in arraignments

Policy/Procedure Improvements

(continued)

- Creation of DV Forensic documentation services
 - Victims to HAVEN START for treatment and forensic evidence collection
 - Purchase Illumicam camera for use by FHPD investigators
- Increased utilization of Prevention Education services in local schools

CASE STUDY – MS. SMITH

- Officers dispatched to a Domestic Violence assault.
- After on-scene investigation, suspect is arrested for Domestic Violence and Interfering with 911 call.
- Victim stated to Officers that a week prior she had been strangled by suspect.
- Patrol Lieutenant (member of the High Risk Team) was advised of the strangulation
- The Detective (member of the High Risk Team) was advised of the incident and contacted the victim and arranged a follow up interview.
- The Detective did a Danger Assessment with the results of 27 (extreme danger) and contacted a HAVEN Advocate (member of the High Risk Team)
- Prosecutor charged suspect with DV and Interfering. He was arraigned and given a bond of \$25,000, No Contact with Victim and GPS tether upon release, which was recommend by Pre-Trial Services (member of the High Risk Team).

CASE STUDY (CONTINUED)

- The detective met with the victim and noticed swelling to her neck and that she had a scratchy voice.
- The detective contacted START/HAVEN RN about the swelling and voice and we set up a time to have victim examined.
- ► The START/HAVEN RN examined victim and also observed bruising in her ear. START/HAVEN referred victim to the hospital for further care.
- ▶ The State Prosecutor wrote a new charge of <u>STRANGULATION</u>.
- Suspect plead guilty to the DV 1st and interfering with 911 and was sentenced to 1 year in the Oakland County Jail by a Judge at the 47 District Court (member of the High Risk Team).
- Suspect later plead guilty to the Strangulation and was sentenced to 9 months by the Oakland County Circuit Court Judge.
